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lse, an NHS worker from
Worsley, Manchester, wanted
to create a garden that was
a calm oasis to relieve the
pressure of her demanding job as well
as a sanctuary and habitat for wildlife.

She wanted a garden that was another room on the footprint of the house, with nature as the design and where she could do as much or as little gardening as she felt, with the satisfaction of eating her own grown produce.

She enlisted the help of awardwinning garden designer David Keegan to create a calm oasis that would relieve the pressure of her demanding job, while providing a habitat for insects and wildlife.

David created an eco-garden, designed with a focus on natural, sustainable materials and encouraging wildlife. In conversation with Ilse, the homeowner, David suggested creating a space which would both connect the internal living areas with the garden and that would transport Ilse into a feeling of being within nature, as opposed to just 'being ouside'. So, while the space

feels connected when viewed from inside of the house, it feels separate from the outside.

One of the changes David made to the space was to remove the lawn and replace it with a cobble base, which he said is less environmentally demanding than a lawn would be, and avoided tropical hardwoods, instead opting for American yellow pine.

A bug hotel was incorporated to run
